New 'natural' playground in works for Odessa

Loyalist Township is looking to get back to nature with a new park that is slated to be constructed next to Odessa's historic Babcock Mill this summer.

Through a partnership with the Odessa Lions Club. township recently revealed Phase 1 plans for a playground 'natural' referred to as Babcock Mill Park, which would be the first of its kind in this area.

"The whole idea is it's going to be inclusive for everybody," said Savage. "It's not just for kids. It's going to be everybody, They did a master plan and it includes the whole mill area and it. shows eventually a gazebo, there's going to be some pathways and some benchthere and enjoy the day there.

An open house meeting was held earlier this month to get public input before they submitted their final design plans. Savage says the job will be going to tender in the next few weeks with the hope to have the first phase of the project completed by the fall.

What the other phases will include is yet to be determined, but Savage savs they plan to add features to the park in its first couple of

es. The people can just go years. For now the playground will include the climbing wall, stumps to hop along, slides, benches, open fields and several other wooden structures for children to climb.

"It's to get the kids outside," Savage says of the main goal of the park in a nutshell. "I don't really see a lot of them on the street. They go home and get on their xBox. This way we're hoping to make (Babcock Mill) a destination."

The first phase has a budget of \$100,000, with \$50,000 each paid by the Lion's Club and Loyalist Township. There are plans for more fundraising efforts to be held throughout the summer. 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
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

QuinteVation is coming to the area with a vision.

The local organization is working to create jobs in the Bay of Quinte region, by attracting entrepreneurs and creating a stronger business community.

The group is focusing on bringing together the Bay of Quinte region to make a business community. Ryan Williams, QuinteVation chairman, said the goal is to get the region to work as one to build the economy.

No one organization represents the whole Quinte region from Brighton to Napanee and Prince Edward County to Hastings, so the goal is to be as inclusive as possible.

"We're not here to replace anyone. We're here to work with existing organizations," said Williams.

The organization will use marketing to attract more entrepreneurs and innovators to the area, with the hopes that they will come and open businesses.

families in here to grow," he said. "Why is that? The number one thing people need is a job."

"I have a vision that in 20 years we will have 35,000 new people living in our region, not the 15,000 currently projected. To which a minimum of 2,500 new jobs have been created," he said.

Local business owner and economic developer Mary Doyle said she joined QuinteVation because she, too, wants the community to grow.

"I have kids too. I want to stay in the area and have them grow up and have a really dynamic and prosperous area that they can raise their families," she said.

Both Doyle and Williams said the organization is a work in progress.

"We don't have all the answers, we know the vision and what we want to be, so we're going out to listen to the community," said Williams.

The organization is looking for more community members, board members and mentors who are interested in the vision to get involved, he added.

she might not have otherwise been exposed to. "What was really cool about that festival was that it led people to a lot of independent artists who weren't getting a lot of attention at the time through the headliners that were part of that festival," she said.

In turn, she went from being a fan to a performer. And, since then, she's been gradually making the transition from classical to folk. "(My sound) kind of evolved over time to be a more of a folk, finger-style, guitar picking accompaniment to my songs," she said. "Much like my guitar evolved from classical training, my voice also changed a lot. I spent so

long as young person training my voice to be a classical singer that it took quite a while to undo that and learn to find my own, authentic voice and bring that out in folk music."

And, in using that voice, she has a story to tell. Because my songs are very much based in the storytelling tradition, I also do a lot of storytelling between the songs — you'll probably hear some little anecdotes and some fun stories from my life," she said.

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

Emily Crockford's bus ride to and from school is 45 minutes. It's a little long, but she knows that is nothing compared to what children around the world have to do for a basic education.

To raise awareness and money for an underprivileged school in Kingston, Jamaica, on Saturday 15-year-old Crockford walked 32.1 kilometres for the second year in a row from her old elementary school, J.J. O'Neill Catholic School in Napanee, to Holy Cross Catholic Secondary School.

"It feels amazing [to be done]," Crockford said on Sunday. "I'm really happy I was able to do it again. I'm a little sore, but it was worth it being able to raise money to help give people a safe education. I feel amazing, I feel really good."

Growing up and learning of the difficulties suffered by children around the world just to attend school, Crockford realized she didn't have it so bad. Suddenly complaints about a 45-minute bus ride seem trivial.

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

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
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

Raiders build early lead to beat Isles

The Napanee Raiders took the importance of scoring first a little bit beyond the opening goal in their Provincial Junior Hockey League game Sunday night.

The Raiders not only scored the first goal, but went on to put up enough of a cushion on the scoreboard to account for more than the winning margin before letting the Gananoque Islanders join in the fun.

Napanee netted the first four goals of the game as it downed the Islanders by three goals, 7-4, in Gananoque.

The Tod Division second-place Raiders improved to 15-7-0 with the win, while Gananoque (11-11-1) dropped into fourth place, two points behind the Picton Pirates (12-11-1), who beat the Amherstview Jets 5-3 also Sunday.

Napanee defenceman Curtis Marrison opened the scoring for the visitors 2:05 into the game. Brodie Maracle netted two goals in the first half of the second period and Austin Boulard added one at 15:15 of the second to put Napanee up 4-0.

The Islanders outscored the Raiders 4-3 the rest of the way, but the damage had already been done.

Gan's Jacob Ovens, on a power play, and Napanee's Tyler Ignazzitto, short-handed, swapped goals before the second period was over to make it a 5-1 game heading into the third period.

Power-play goals from Gananoque's Mitch Brennan and Nathan Domen in the opening three minutes of the third narrowed the score to 5-3, but further insurance from Napanee's Tim Morton, at 3:36, gave the Raiders a three-goal cushion again.

Gananoque's Chris Minns, on a power play at 16:34, and a hat trick-completing goal by Maracle, into an empty net with 1:01 remaining, finished off the scoring.

Boulard collected four points on the night (1G, 3A), while the game also marked the junior C debut of Kingston native forward Kyle Hancock. Playing as an affiliated player from the Greater Kingston Jr. Frontenacs midgets, Hancock picked up a pair of assists.

The Raiders outshot the Islanders 44-37 in the game.

On Friday night, the Campbellford Rebels,

who had not played since Nov. 19, were handed their 19th loss in 19 games, courtesy of the home-ice Raiders, who scored eight times before the Rebels hit the scoreboard in an 8-1 decision.

Campbellford, which also lost to the undefeated first-place Port Hope Panthers 8-1 on Saturday night to drop its record to 0-20, remains one of only two teams in the 63-team league without a win to start the season. The Delhi Travellers of the West Conference's Doherty Division are 0-24.

Riley Steeves, Boulard and Devon King each scored twice for the Raiders. Single goals were scored by Sean Robertson and Tyler Ignazzitto.

Campbellford's Nicholas Grosjean ended Jeremy Wasson's bid for a shutout at 13:21 of the third period. Wasson faced just 16 shots in the game, compared to 44 for Dryden Bedard.

This week, the Raiders host the fifth-place Amhertsview Jets (6-15-0) on Friday night at 7:30 p.m.

| How much land do you need? | The Project may use up to approximately 544 acres of land. |
| Concern about impacts to wildlife including Loggerhead Shrike. | The Project is subject to the Renewable Energy Approval process and studies have been conducted in accordance with the Natural Heritage Assessment Guide. Potential wildlife impacts have been assessed by Ministry of Natural Resources and Forestry (MNRF) and the mitigations to avoid or minimize wildlife impacts have been accepted. Species at Risk in the area have been assessed and either habitats have been avoided or compensation measures will be established as per the MNRF's requirements. Loggerhead Shrike nest locations have been identified and avoided with the buffer required by MNRF. |
| Concern about impacts to property values | There is no evidence that proximity to a solar facility will result in a loss to property values. | What are the next steps in this process? | The reports comprising the REA application are anticipated to be completed in Q4 2016. Once the reports are completed, they will be made available for public review at least 60 days before the next public meeting. Once the public meeting has taken place, the reports may be updated based on the results of that consultation.
